Dear Parents/Carers,

As previously mentioned we are currently promoting a love of reading. We are actively working to drive our reading culture across school. Research shows that regular reading improves brain connectivity, increases your vocabulary and comprehension and empowers you to empathise with other people. At the heart of our whole school strategy is our drive to foster a love of reading, enriching children's learning through carefully designed teaching activities that utilize imaginative story writing and thought provoking texts. Reading is a skill that enables children to develop their learning across the wider curriculum and lays the foundation for success in future lines of study and employment.



As we believe that reading is key to all learning, our children have the opportunity to enter the wide and magical world that reading opens them up to. As children develop their own interest in books, a deep love of literature across a range of genres and styles is enhances. This, in turn, develops the writing skills, another part of our whole school strategy.

Thank you those families who have already donated some pre-loved books to school. We are still taking any donations of high quality, good condition books outside my office. I am hoping that after Christmas we may have further donations!

To continue sharing best practice and celebrate our school successes, we welcome visitors, Governors and other local colleagues. Before Christmas we will be welcoming colleagues from the Bright Future Learning Trust and Elaine Cooper, a CEO from another local Trust to support and challenge Goldsworth senior leaders, ensuring that we are driving school forwards for the best for our children and staff. We look forward to sharing our developments with you in early spring when we share our school improvement priorities for the year.

Research on Reading

Research from the department for Education's Reading Framework shows how many words children would learning by the time they were 5 years old:

- Never read to 4662 words
- 1-2 times per week 63,570 words
- 3-5 times per week 163,520 words
- Daily 296,660 words
- Five books a day 1,483,300 words

Research also shows that reading for pleasure can promote better health and wellbeing, aids in building social connections and relationships with others and is associated with a range of factors that increase the chances of social mobility.

Reading for pleasure: is more important for children's cognitive development than their parent's level of education and is a more powerful factor later in life than socio-economic background.

Having books in the home is associated with both reading enjoyment and confidence. Of children who report fewer than 10 books in their homes, 42% say they do not like reading and only 32% say they are 'very confident' readers. For children who report having over 200 books at home, only 12% they do not like reading and 73% consider themselves 'very confident' readers.

Children who read books often at age 10 and more than once a week at age 16 gain higher results in maths, vocabulary and spelling tests at age 16 than those who read less regularly.

Well done Goldsworth, this week we have read **1,246** times! We have many avid readers across the school but the class who have read the most this week is Moles class, followed by 6C and then Hedgehogs. Well done 6C you are the most improved class with a whopping 142 reads recorded this week.

Well done in particular to the following children who have recorded the most amount of reads this week:

- Fletcher in Hedgehogs with 27 reads
- Taylia in 6C with 25 reads
- Ada in Moles with 23 reads

Huge well done to all who are reading at home and at school, we are really keen for all children to record when they are reading. At the moment Reception are reading the most, then Year 6 and then Year 3 ... let's see what will happen next week. Try and challenge yourself to read more, whether it be another page of a chapter book, another 5 minutes ... remember those marginal gains of 1% we talk about. Keep reading!

Curriculum Swimming

Payments towards curriculum swimming lessons can now be made on ParentMail. Reception children will receive 8 lessons during the course of the year whilst the rest of the school will receive 12 lessons.

The Curriculum swimming lessons are a great way of introducing children to swimming (and hopefully starting a lifelong love of swimming) as well as allowing more experienced swimmers to hone their technique. However, we would encourage all children to have additional lessons beyond those provided during the school day. As well as Woking's lessons at Pool in the Park, there are a number of private swim schools in the area and we also run after school lessons during term time.
