

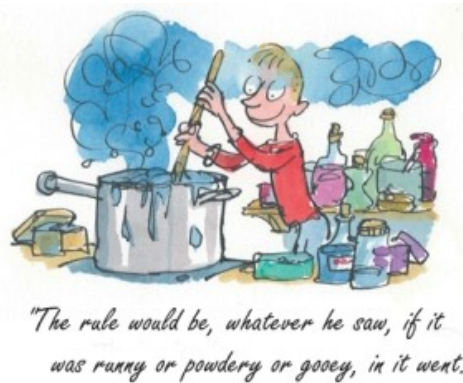
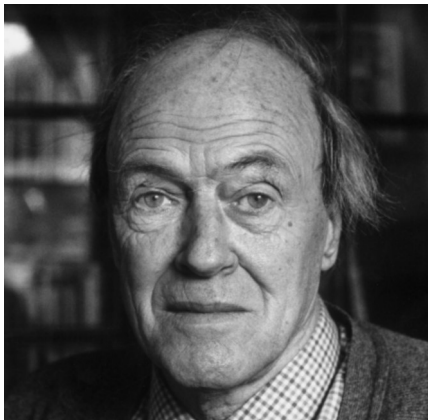


Mischief, Magic and Medicine

As Writers, we will write instructions for our own potions. We will then use these skills to create instructions for our own biscuits. Next, we will look into the life and times of Florence Nightingale, reflect on letters sent from her and write our own replies.

As Readers, we will read and respond to the famous *George's Marvellous Medicine* by Roald Dahl.

As Historians, we will investigate famous people, such as Roald Dahl, Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole and what impact they have on our lives today.

As Scientists, we will be thinking about seasonal changes. We will be using the skills of observation over time, and we will discuss similarities and differences we notice about seasonal change. Finally, we will begin looking at growing a plant from a bulb.

As Mathematicians, we will begin by looking money, counting in coins and notes as well as revisiting our knowledge of addition and subtraction to solve problems involving money. After this, we move onto multiplication; counting in equal groups of 2, 5, 10 and 3, doubling and halving, grouping and sharing amounts.

As Artists—we will illustrate in the style of Quentin Blake.

As Design Technologists—we will plan, make and evaluate our own biscuits, thinking about flavours that complement one another.
