Review of last year's spend and key achievements (2023/2024)

	Next Steps (2024 – 2025)
To purchase new equipment to introduce more sports and replace existing equipment to ensure children have sufficient opportunities to be actively engaged in physical activity. To introduce new PE curriculum to support nonspecialist teachers in delivering PE To offer PE CPD opportunities for teachers. To broaden the extracurricular provision and raise the profile of PE in the community All new equipment has enabled a wider range of sports to be offered across the PE curriculum and through extra-curricular provision. Children are more confident in delivering lessons partially due to the equipment available to the children are more active in lessons due to the improvements in the PE resources New PE curriculum is in place and this is supporting teachers in ensuring that the key skills and knowledge are being taught across a range of sports. Teachers are more confident in delivering PE lessons and provided positive feedback on the lessons. The GetSet4PE scheme has supported the PE leader to map out the curriculum to ensure that children are developing physical fitness, developing fundamental skills, as well as looking at target games, net games and invasion games. Lessons are sequenced across units and the whol curriculum is mapped out to ensure it is progressive and demanding. All KS2 teachers have been supported by a gymnastics specialist to deliver 2 half terms of lessons. They have developed their confidence in the knowledge and skills the children need for these units. The gymnastics teacher has also supported with CPD for KS1 teachers which has developed their confidence a well. Children are positive about gymnastics sessions and uptake for inter house competitions are high. All Year 5 and Year 6 children have experience tennis opportunities at Woking Tennis Club. Children experience high quality provision and teachers are learning from the expertise. Teachers in Year 4 and Year 6 have worked with cricket coaches to deliver cricket sessions. Through the chance to shine programme, teachers have worked alongside cricket coaches which has developed their own knowledge.

Year 1 teachers have run sessions with sports coaches from In2sport. They have delivered our curriculum and this has supported teacher confidence in delivering lessons.

PE leader how worked with Active Surrey to improve PE offer at school. PE leader has attended CPD through Active Surrey and shared this with staff. Training was also attended on supporting children with specific needs and this was also shared by the class teacher.

We now have a wider extra-curricular offer which is also enhanced by outside school providers. Expertise from the community has also supported to improve our offer and to ensure further community involvement. Families in our community have taken advantage of links with Woking FC and Farnborough and we are looking to further enhance this in the upcoming years. Approximately 150 children have watched live football through our partnerships with Woking Men and Women's Teams and Farnborough FC. On top of our curriculum offer Year 4 and 6 have experienced Chance to Shine cricket opportunities, with Years 1 through to 6 experiencing enriching sessions in the final week of term. This year, Dance live was introduced to the school and it had an incredible uptake. We have also had coaches from In2sport who have supported with enriching our curriculum offer.

Within school we have run a number of inter house gymnastics competitions across Key Stage 2 which have been really successful and had a high uptake. This year we have taken part in: Year 1 Sportshall athletics, Pantathalon, Tri golf, Girls' Football leagues and tournaments, Boys' football leagues and tournaments, cricket leagues, rounders competition, Year 5 and 6 indoor athletics, Key Stage 2 Quad kids, multiskills, cross country, orienteering, swimming and dance live.

Within school there have been interhouse competitions for gymnastics across Key Stage 2, a Reception Sports Day, Key Stage 1 Sports Day, Key Stage 2 Sports Day, Year 5 Swimming gala and Year 6 Swimming gala.

To replenish equipment to: introduce more sports and replace existing equipment to ensure children have sufficient opportunities to be actively engaged in physical activity through clubs, competitions, lunchtime provision and PE lessons	By replenishing and improving our resources, our PE provision has improved and more children are active within lessons. This has also enabled us to have a wider range of sports available to the children across our curriculum. By improving our resources, we have also been able to improve activity during break and lunchtimes as well as offering a wider range of clubs. This year we have funded curriculum resources as well as basketball hoops and football goals to support both the curriculum and getting more children active.
To embed and improve PE curriculum to support non-specialist teachers in delivering PE To ensure the curriculum is sequential, progressive, demanding and ambitious for all.	Our PE curriculum has now seen a full cycle through 2024-2025 and through monitoring we are seeing that teachers are continually gaining confidence (staff surveys, pupil voice, lesson monitoring and external validation) with delivering PE lessons and are able to adapt the lessons accordingly. Feedback from teachers continues to demonstrate their growing confidence and we have seen particular improvement in areas such as dance. Children are also now able to know and remember more and learning is linked across units taught throughout the year. Next year, these links will be able to be made to previous years as well. The curriculum is now well mapped to demonstrate sequential learning, progression and ensure that it is demanding. Within our Trust we have had several schools visit to see our PE curriculum in action and discuss our curriculum design. This has provided valuable feedback in the strength of our PE offer within the school.
To provide CPD opportunities for teachers to improve teaching and wider provision for children to be active	We have continued to provide CPD for our KS2 teachers through specialized team teaching and next year, one year group will move to leading this without the specialist support and we will support another cohort. Children continue to be positive about gymnastics sessions and uptake for inter house competitions remain high. This has supported teachers in developing their confidence with not only the key knowledge and skills needed, but also how to organize a lesson, manage equipment and understand the health and safety aspects of the lesson. The gymnastics specialist has also reviewed the gymnastics lessons within the scheme for Reception and KS1 and is confident that the knowledge and skills build up to the teaching at KS2. Through doing this, they have also offered advice and support to the KS1 teachers which has helped to develop their confidence even more this year. Funding has been spent on active play training through Active Surrey for lunchtime supervisors in order for break and lunch times to be more active. Two Reception support staff attended training through bikeability and the impact of this can be seen regularly within the Reception outdoor provision. The team have confidently and effectively implemented the 'Get Cycling' scheme into their curriculum. Children have made excellent progress in their cycling skills and the staff confidence in how to support the children is high. The PE leader has also had the opportunity to work with colleagues within the Trust and have received feedback to validate the strength of our PE offer here at Goldsworth and be able to share expertise.

To broaden the internal extracurricular provision (including clubs, sports and events) and raise the number of children attending Year 5 and 6 children continue to benefit from sessions at Woking Tennis Club and through the links we have built, we are hoping to support with hosting some mini festivals at the school next year for our younger children and to support with CPD. Woking Tennis are also currently building their links up within WASPS.

Through our gymnastics specialist, we have had lunchtime gymnastics clubs and interhouse competitions for Years 3 through to Year 6 and the update for these is high. Within school we have continued to run interhouse competitions for gymnastics across Key Stage 2, a Reception Sports Day, Key Stage 1 Sports Day, Key Stage 2 Sports Day, Year 5 Swimming gala and Year 6 Swimming gala. We have also now been able to run an interschool Year 2 football tournament which was well attended as well as additional Saturday football tournaments for Year 2 children.

Through regular sports personality, sports assemblies, sports captains, sports boards, match reports and new kit, we have continued to raise the profile of sport within our Goldworth community and this continues to grow. We have now also achieved the Gold School Games mark based on our PE and wider sports offer.

To increase the number of opportunities for external extra-curricular competitions and opportunities

This year we have continued to take part in a range of sporting events offered through Active Surrey, Wasps, Local community and local clubs: Year 3 & 4 athletics, Year 5 & 6 athletics, Royal Holloway Spring Festival, Girls' Football leagues and tournaments, Boys' football leagues and tournaments, cricket leagues, rounders competition, Year 5 and 6 indoor athletics, Key Stage 2 Quad kids, multiskills, cross country, orienteering, swimming and dance live.

Through careful tracking we have been able to target children who have not attended extra-curricular competitions and opportunities to offer them opportunities and provided a wider offer for those within our school.

24% of all KS1 pupils have taken part in a competition
72% of all KS2 pupils have taken part in a competition
72% of Pupil Premium KS2 pupils have taken part in a competition

83% of Year 6 have been to a competition/event and 83% of PP children in Year 6 have attended a competition/event

Swimming Data

Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	77%	3% of the children were new to the school and had no swimming ability before joining Goldsworth. 80% of our year 6 cohort have been taught swimming at Goldsworth since Reception (apart from 2020, when no swimming took place).
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	72%	These students can swim and have knowledge of all 4 strokes and can swim them confidently for a distance of 25 metres.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	97%	97% of the children passed the water safety program which incused swimming in clothes, signaling for help and floating with lifesaving strokes.
